A Worthy Cause

After the attacks on the Pentagon and the World Trade Center, I became so disgusted with the false news that was being reported that I stopped watching the news. That lasted until recently, when voice operated TV remote controls became available. After that, I decided that cable TV (*et al*) had become a surveillance and data collection network. Hoping to avoid the network, I installed a TV antenna and disconnected from cable. The antenna doesn't provide as many channels as I'd previously received, but that's better than being connected to the surveillance network. PBS has one of the most reliable broadcast signals so, 20 or so years after I stopped watching the news, I started watching it again, mostly on PBS.

I've noticed lately that PBS has a lot of propaganda. Various factions are represented, but the programs mostly deal with racial, feminist, homosexual, and transgender complaints. It's good that such people can express their opinions, but other people have other opinions on such issues. I haven't noticed those other people appearing in any of the programs. The programs tacitly accept or even promote the idea that the complaints must be resolved by the forcible intervention of government, and always in favor of the complaining parties. Although the programs resemble documentaries, the content is always in support of the complaining parties. I'm reminded of the false news, mentioned above. The programs aren't documentaries. They're propaganda.

A large part of the complaining in the programs deals with a lack of toleration of somebody or something. Intolerance is a bad thing. Demanding toleration is reasonable, but the complainers don't stop there. They also demand approval. When they do that, then they've crossed a line. I might agree to an obligation to tolerate things or people that I don't like, but I don't have an obligation to like them. If those people can prove that my behavior is harmful to them, then they have a cause to complain, but only about my behavior. My beliefs are not theirs to condemn. When they condemn my beliefs, then they're not trying to

protect themselves. They're trying to control my beliefs. That's reminiscent of the zealots who persecuted heretics during the various inquisitions and pogroms of the past. Those zealots believed that their cause was worthy, and that they had Right on their side. That didn't excuse their behavior. The dogma and the punishments might have changed, but the attitude is the same. The enforcers of today's worthy causes are demanding not just toleration, but approval of every belief that they like, and the eradication of any belief that they don't like. I'm required to tolerate things that I don't like, but they're not required to tolerate me not liking them. Today's zealots believe that their cause is worthy, and that they have Right on their side. That doesn't excuse their behavior.

When a worthy cause is imposed by force, fraud, or coercion, then it isn't a worthy cause any more. It's a crusade, enforcing dogma and punishing heresy. Here's the irony in the crusade for toleration. The only time that you have to tolerate people is if you don't like them. If you like them, then tolerating them isn't an issue. So, by their own demands, today's advocates of toleration have acknowledged that people don't like them. *C'est la vie.*

Trying to achieve approval by force won't produce approval and it won't reduce intolerance. It will only make things worse. We can see that in our history, and in events around the world today. We're probably never going to like each other but maybe we can at least try to get along. It's worth a try, but we need a plan that's achievable, at least in theory, isn't inherently counterproductive, and doesn't require the use of force, fraud, or coercion. So far, nobody's been able to figure out how to do that, but it seems like a worthy cause.

Regarding my article "A Cold Place", I'll concede one point. I might be wrong about how cold it will get. Beyond that, I'm not impressed by criticisms from people who claim to have academic educations. After I graduated from

Texas A&M University, with a BS in Nuclear Engineering, and went to work as a Nuclear Engineer at the General Electric Company, I noticed that what I'd learned at A&M didn't have much to do with the work that I did at GE. It shouldn't have been unexpected. When I was young, my father mentioned something about the meaning of BS. Then he told me that MS means more of the same and PhD means piled higher and deeper. In later years, I observed that getting a so-called higher education often means learning more and more about less and less while understanding less and less about more and more. Today, scientists have reduced the understanding of cosmology to a kind of secular catechism. They faithfully recite their catechism, and they don't think beyond the boundaries of their academic brainwashing. Like their theological counterparts, they can get hostile if you challenge their dogma.

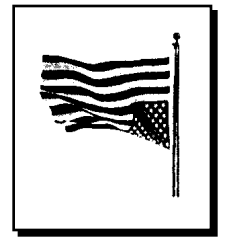
Stray Thoughts
