I'm not skeptical of the effectiveness of vaccinations, only of the consequences of their use. Today, overpopulation is the most serious problem on the planet. It's the problem that's driving most of the others. Things aren't getting better. They're getting worse. Indeed, I speculate that, today, the number of people who are afflicted with infectious diseases is probably larger than the population of the entire planet was, just a few centuries ago. Thus, vaccinations haven't made things better. In conjunction with other well-intentioned practices, vaccinations have made things worse. I've written about that and related subjects, and in greater detail, in *Mercymongers*, in the January 1995 issue, in Darwin's Wolf, in the February 2021 issue, and elsewhere.

Since I started reading science fiction, in the late 1950s, I've read several stories in which overpopulation was a serious problem. The solutions to the problems that I saw in the stories weren't necessarily honorable or humane, only necessary. Now, fact has caught up with fiction. We're faced with a disastrous population explosion. I don't know how to solve the problem but I do know one thing for sure. Trying as hard as possible to keep as many people as possible alive for as long as possible isn't going to

Letter to the Editor Dear Sam:

Before last year's election, I read, on-line, an interesting article prepared by Wired magazine. It was a transcript of a panel discussion, (also sponsored by Wired magazine) entitled: "Is Silicon Valley Actually Libertarian. I believe that I have the qualifications to validly answer that question. I have resided in Santa Clara County (A.K.A. "Silicon Valley") for more than forty years. During most of that time, I have been a member of the Libertarian Party of Santa Clara County. Also, between 1990 and 2014, I participated in the production of a callin talk show, "Free and Clear", that aired on radio station KKUP, 91.5 FM, Cupertino, California. The purpose of the program was to promote libertarian ideas.

The majority of voters in Santa Clara County are registered Democrats. Democrats and Republicans together greatly outnumber Libertarians in the count. In forty years time, I know of only three Libertarian candidates who were elected to local office. No, Silicon Valley is <u>not</u> libertarian. Silicon Valley is being <u>called</u> libertarian because some well-known high-tech entrepreneurs have been using the word, and because some pundits are classifying them as libertarians. Those entrepreneurs are in favor

of lower taxes, and of less regulation of business. Their positions are traditionally libertarian, but they are also traditionally conserva-

Elon Musk, Peter Thiel, and Marc Andreessen are the most notable members of this socalled libertarian group. From what I have read of their positions, I would classify them as propertarian libertarians. Propertarian libertarians regard property rights as the logical basis of all social rights. Therefore, when there is a conflict between property usage and civil liberties, they are in favor of sacrificing civil liberties.

I may be oversimplifying the situation somewhat, but I think I am essentially correct Plutocrats are in favor of plutocracy.
