It seems like almost everybody has a cell phone. Refugees have them. Homeless people have them. Even people who can't afford food sometimes have them. Almost everybody, that is, except me.

I don't use a cell phone because I believe that a cell phone is part of a world-wide surveillance network. I believe that it can be used to eavesdrop on whoever's carrying it, whether or not he's actually using it at the time. It can be used to determine the location of whoever's carrying it, to determine his locations in the past, when he was there, and with whom. Given the right situation, a cell phone can be used as a weapon of assassination. The Israelis have done it. Probably, the U.S. government has also done it, but with less publicity. Cell phones have even been used as targets for missile strikes. Also, cell phones appear to be addictive. People who have them don't seem able to be without them.

Next, consider the relevant capabilities of AI. ECHELON pales by comparison. Even ignoring its other capabilities, AI will have access to every cell phone, regardless of the assurances of the apologists for world-wide surveillance. Already, there isn't any such thing as a secure database or a secure cell phone. Eventually, AI will be in control of not only the entire communications network but also of the measures that will allegedly protect the privacy and security of its users. AI will know where each person is, where he's been, when and how often he was there, and with whom. It will know of every meeting, every rendezvous, every tryst. It will be able to notify a person's wife, his boss, his girlfriend, or his enemies. It will have audio and video data as proof, or it can fabricate such data as needed. It will be able to present that data anywhere or everywhere, at any time. As a tool of intimidation, it will be able to contact anybody, and threaten such action.

Lately, an even more insidious device, the so-called smart phone, is being widely used. Cell phones were voluntary, at least in theory, but smart phones aren't. They've become prerequisites for access to various things that a person needs. The apologists for the world-wide

police state will assure us that the possession of such a device is voluntary but, if somebody is prohibited, for lack of a smart phone, from going someplace that he needs to go, from doing something that he needs to do, or from having access to something to which he needs to have access, then the devices are mandatory. Things that will go to only a smart phone, access information of one kind or another for example, are instances of the scheme to make sure that the devices are mandatory, as just noted.

In the miniseries *Amerika*, released in 1987, General Samanov, the Soviet National Advisor to occupied America, in the miniseries, said. "We must act before Americans begin to understand they have options. None of us anymore believe Americans will resist to the death. But there are other options. They could simply refuse to cooperate. They could unify in spirit." I'm trying to not cooperate. I do have an old cell phone, but the account was closed long ago, after I began to understand the implications of having a cell phone. I kept the old cell phone because it also takes pictures and it's compatible with my old computer. When I want to take a picture, I put the battery in the cell phone. After the picture is transferred into my computer, I remove the battery from the cell phone. Removing the battery is a precaution in addition to the closed cell phone account. That is, how do I know for sure that, even with its account closed, the cell phone is really inaccessible to the agencies? So, I remove the battery. My old style land line provides all of the communication that I want, except for manipulative schemes such as access information, mentioned above. That can be a problem for me, so I have to improvise. Even so, I can still unplug the land line when I don't want to be bothered or monitored.

I'll concede that cell phones and smart phones are providing important information about events around the world, and that the information might not be available otherwise, but the significant risks to life and liberty, previously mentioned, still exist. People should be free to decide for themselves whether or not to have such devices, but they should not be deprived of things that they need, merely because of the lack of one. Also, it would be a sensible precaution for people who choose to have the devices to at least remove the batteries →

when they're not actually using the devices. That preserves access to the usefulness of the devices but might provide some protection against the police state. If not, then a bit of my father's advice comes to mind. He said, "Son, if you can't fix it, get a bigger hammer." 🦧

and murder people." We live in a police state. Almost anything can get you arrested.

The only way that I have to do a "fact check" is via Google. I did several searches. Although the results didn't actually contradict one another, they were different each time. I'm including one of them below. In one of them, not shown below, the Chinese government claimed to have "reformed its organ transplant system and now uses organs from voluntary donors." "Wow!" said the blonde, "That's amazing! I'm going to buy it!"

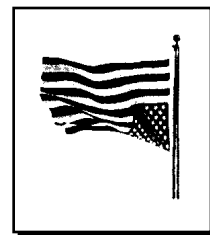
So she bought the thermos and took it to work the next day. Her boss, who was also a blonde, saw it on her desk. "What's that?" she asked.
